

NEW CARBURETOR ICE DETECTOR

The ARP carburetor Ice Detector has been standard equipment on many singles and twins for almost 20 years, but the tried-and-tested addition to the instrument panel may become even more popular among safety-minded aircraft owners with the increased trend to use mo-gas.

A recent FAA carb ice study revealed that the use of automotive fuel in aircraft "commences icing twice as soon . . . as compared to 100LL aviation fuel."

Carburetor ice is recognized as a major cause of engine failure or malfunction, and with carburetor design changes such as ram air intake systems that increase engine operating efficiences there are also increased chances of ice build-up due to lowered incoming air temperatures. The ARP Carburetor Ice Detector features an optical scanner sensor warning device that alerts the pilot to an ice build-up and allows for proper application of carb heat.

FAA tests conducted at the Atlantic City Technical Center, demonstrated that the ARP system offers the pilot up to a 15-minute warning before the engine is affected by loss of RPM, manifold pressure or both.

To comply with A.D. 86-06-09-12, simply remove the numeral labels from the backing and place one over the first 21 which appears on the June, September and December calendar pages.

PLEASE NOTE: Compliance with A.D. 86-06-09-12 is NOT REQUIRED. You may be one of the lucky individuals with two birthdays in 1986, or you may decide that SPORT AVIATION '86 could become a valuable collector item as is. The choice is yours.
